




From the desks of Pappi & Woodward

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Amazing Animal Teeth

April is Oral Health Month, so it's a good month for reminders about brushing, flossing, eating right and doing everything to take care of your teeth.

Of course, people aren't the only ones with teeth. The animal kingdom is full of animals with weird and sometimes terrifying teeth. Here are just a few. What would you do if you saw these in your neighbourhood?



Musk Deer

The musk deer of Asia has long fangs instead of antlers. With a face that looks a little like a kangaroo, and teeth a little like Dracula's, musk deer are *herbivores* (plant eaters). It uses its long teeth to scrape off moss and other vegetation to eat.



The Narwhal

Sometimes called the "unicorn of the sea," this small, 13-foot (4m)-long whale has a "spear-tooth" atop its head. Scientists think this could be used for protection and to break up ice in the whale's arctic habitat. The narwhal's "horn" is actually a right canine tooth that grows forwards through the animal's forehead.

The Babirusa

The *babirusa* have teeth which are used as weapons. Native to Indonesia, these "Deer Pigs" have massive lower canines that curl, fang-like, over the upper jaw. Their upper canines also come in backwards, pairing with the lower tusks and curling back towards the head. The babirusa must grind their teeth down as they can grow into the animal's skull, killing the beast.

Hippopotamus

The hippopotamus is the third largest land animal and it has the largest canines of any land animal. It has two sword-like teeth that grow to be 16 inches (40cm) in length.

- ☞ An elephant's tooth can weigh three kilograms? That's heavier than a big jug of milk!
- ☞ Even though whales are very big, some of them don't have any teeth. Instead, they have rows of stiff hair like combs that take food out of the ocean.
- ☞ Snails are very small but they can have thousands of tiny teeth all lined up in rows.
- ☞ Minnows have teeth in their throat.
- ☞ Rabbit's teeth never stop growing. They keep them worn down by gnawing on bark and other hard foods.
- ☞ Lemon sharks grow a new set of teeth every two weeks. They grow more than 24,000 new teeth every year!
- ☞ Every year in China, people celebrate a special holiday called "Love Your Teeth Day".

Grade 4 Class helps the Creek, by Devon C.

Last fall, Ms. Little's class visited Leonard's Creek and that's not all. First they cleaned the creek...now they will plant aquatic plants to help the creek. Our class has been at the creek several times.

About the Creek

Before we went to the creek there were dams, garbage and other harmful things. The creek is very long and does not have much wildlife because the water is not very clean so the animals would get sick.

About the Plants

Our class will be planting Blue Vervain, White Boneset, Swamp Milkweed and Joe Pye Weed. The plants will be grown inside on March 30th and then will be transferred to the creek in June.

Indoor Planting

We will have the plants inside until June. We will have them in an indoor garden where they will get enough light. We will need to water them to keep the soil moist. Make sure you don't trample the plants but make sure you come and see our plants.

About the Creek

We've been to Leonard's creek a few times. The first time we just looked around the place. The creek was clogged so we unclogged it. In the fall we cleaned up the garbage and in the winter it was all ice, very thick, really thick.

The Indoor Garden

Dana from the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority is coming to set up our indoor garden on March 30th. She will be setting up a light that is on a timer so the plants will grow well. We will be watering them and taking care of them until they mature.

About the Plants

We will be planting at Leonard's Creek in June. The indoor garden is going to be in the class for 3 months. We'll be planting Blue Vervain, White Boneset, Swamp Milkweed and Joe Pye Weed. Do you know the plants will grow up to 1 metre or more!

I think we're going to make a difference.

What did we do last time we went?

When are we planting?

We are going to get an indoor garden on March 30th, 2015. We will be going to Leonard's Creek again in June to start planting the plants from our garden really close to the creek. We are going to show our plants a little TLC, that means tender loving care.

Leonard's Creek is in the forest right next to Crossroads Park which is not far from our school.

What are we planting?

Miss Little's Grade Four class has been cleaning up the creek and now they are planting! Wow! What a helping hand. They were hoping everyone could stay off the plants and please don't touch them.

Leonard's Creek, by Samantha S.

On March 30th, we are planting an indoor garden and the plants we are planting are Blue Vervain, White Boneset, Swamp Milkweed and Joe Pye Weed. We are planting the plants in the creek in June. Our class knows that there is too much nitrogen and phosphorus in the creek. I would like to say that we want to help the creek so that plants can grow and living creatures can live in it.

To keep the plants alive, first you always give the plants the right amount of light and water. You need to always have fresh soil, then you have to check the starter garden. 

A **tangram** begins as a square. The square is cut into seven pieces. Each piece is called a **tan**.


Tangrams are used to make pictures. All seven pieces must be used. They must touch, but none may overlap.







Early Tangram Evidence

The earliest known Chinese book with a tangram puzzle in it is dated 1813, but the puzzle was very old by then. One reason for this could be that in China at the time, the tangram puzzle was considered a game for women and children. This would have made it unworthy of “serious” study and unlikely to be written about.

In the 19th century, when Europe and the United States started trading with China, sailors brought home this new-found game. “The Chinese Puzzle” spawned a flood of books and picture card sets.



The Beautiful Snail




The Shell

Snails hatch from eggs as teeny, tiny snails. As they grow, the shell grows, too.



Snails don't live just in gardens. They can also be found in ponds and even in the ocean. They are related to oysters, clams and even octopuses. They are part of the group of animals with soft bodies known as mollusks.



Tentacle Eyes and Nose

A snail's eyes are at the end of its long tentacles. The short tentacles are for smelling.

Breathing Hole


Snails breathe through a hole near their shell.

One Fine Foot

Snails slide along the flat part of their body, called the "foot." Snails make a trail of silvery slime. This helps them to slide up walls and even crawl upside down.



If the weather turns very cold or very dry, a snail pulls into its shell and waits for the cool, damp weather it loves. It fills up the opening of its shell with a mucus-like slime, that hardens into a snug door.




